

#### SPECIAL INTEREST GROUPS



# Digital FoC Assessment Tools Now Available LAMP Alumni Exclusive Access

Alumni of the ILC Fundamentals of Care Leadership and Mentoring Program (LAMP) now can access digital versions of two Flinders University-developed tools.

The Flinders Fundamentals of Care Assessment Tool for Clinical Practice and the Flinders Fundamentals of Care Leadership Reflection Tool support LAMP participants in identifying areas of strength and areas for growth in relation to fundamental care. These practical tools are exclusive to the ILC's LAMP and are now available on the ILC website.

The tools were developed by Flinders University researcher and inaugural ILC Erik Elgaard Sorensen Foundation Fellow, Dr Rebecca Feo. The Flinders Fundamentals of Care Assessment Tool for Clinical Practice enables healthcare leaders and clinicians to assess fundamental care delivery within their clinical context at multiple levels – individual, team, unit/ward, or organisational. The tool helps to identify priority areas for improvement in relation to fundamental care delivery, informing decision-making and planning efforts.

The Flinders Fundamentals of Care Leadership Reflection Tool supports current and emerging healthcare leaders to identify their skills, confidence, and competence in their leadership for fundamental care. By using the tool, current and emerging leaders can identify areas for leadership growth and areas of leadership strength, supporting their continued professional development. The tool is based on the ILC's Aalborg statement and its value propositions of Value, Talk, Do, Own, and Research.

Digitising the tools has helped to create a more practical, user-friendly experience for LAMP participants. The tools are available for LAMP participants as part of an exclusive licensing agreement between Flinders University and the ILC, showcasing the impact of the collaborative relationships between the ILC and its Founding Partners.



A Bi-Cultural Multidisciplinary Approach to Achieving Excellence in Care for Indigenous Māori: Report From the Wānanga, Auckland, 2023

In October 2023, around 50 healthcare professionals and Māori leaders from across Aotearoa, New Zealand, attended a wānanga, an Indigenous Māori approach for sharing knowledge and engaging in in-depth discussion and deliberation.

Attendees understood the origins of the Fundamentals of Care framework and how it translates to practice. The depth and breadth of meaning when referring to Māori values and practices adds a layer of complexity when attempting to align Māori worldviews with the Fundamentals of Care framework. A key outcome of the day was a call for tāngata Tiriti (people of the Treaty—non-Māori) to continue to work in partnership with tāngata whenua (people of the land—Māori) to explore how the Fundamentals of Care framework could be used with a mode of practice that emphasises Māori values and practices such as whakawhanaungatanga (establishing relationships) and manaakitanga (showing respect, generosity and care for others).

If we define nursing as the science and art of promoting positive human responses to health and illness, at the core of our profession sits the ability to develop a relationship with those for whom we care. Building on that relationship, nurses integrate the physical and psychosocial aspects of care via a series of relational activities influenced by the patient's level of dependence–independence in performing self-care.
